

**Day One: Psalm 105**

1. How should we worship the Lord (1-5)? Who should worship Him (6)? What did God convey through Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob (8-11, 42)? Describe the Lord's sovereignty during Israel's infancy (12-15). How did God use Joseph to demonstrate His power (16-22)? What signs, via Moses and Aaron, did the Lord perform in Egypt (27-36)? How did God's people fare during that time (37-38)? What did God then do for His people (39-41, 43-45)?
2. Which of the commands to worship in verses 1-5 come most naturally to you? Why? Which command feels most foreign? Why? What evidence in your life speaks to God's sovereignty? Where do you see the Lord in control of creation, of world events, etc.? Ask God to sharpen your spiritual senses to see His activity in all things and ask Him for a heart that automatically responds in worship to all of His deeds.

**Day Two: Isaiah 44:6-20**

1. What does God say about himself (6)? What challenge does He issue (7)? What reassurances does He offer (8)? How does the Lord criticize those who make idols (9-11, 18-20)? What does He say about the blacksmith (12)? Summarize His observations about the carpenter (13-17).
2. Picture yourself before the throne of God. What is your posture toward the throne? In what ways do your choices, habits, and priorities reflect a worshipful posture? In what ways are they a red flag, an indicator of idolatry? Repent of any idolatrous beliefs and behaviors and ask Jesus to take His rightful place in your life. Memorize verses 6-8 and bring it to mind whenever you feel tempted to engage in idolatry.

**Day Three: Daniel 2:19-47**

1. How was the mystery revealed to Daniel (19)? Summarize his praises (20-23). What did he ask of Arioch (24)? What was Daniel's explanation for his knowledge of the dream (27-30)? Describe the statue in the dream (31-33). What happened to it (34-35)? In what ways does the head of gold symbolize the king (37-38)? What will the fourth kingdom be like (40-43)? Describe God's kingdom (44-45). How did Nebuchadnezzar respond to Daniel's knowledge and interpretation of the dream (46-47)?
2. Consider a time when the Lord answered a significant and urgent prayer. With that moment in mind, read verses 20-23 and write your own version of praise to God. What would it take for you to make this type of response a regular part of your relationship with the Lord? How does God want to use you as He did Daniel, to reveal His sovereignty to someone? What steps can you take this week to fulfill His desire to use you in this way?

**Day Four: John 3:22-36**

1. What were Jesus and John doing in the countryside (22-23)? What argument were John's disciples having (25-26)? What do you think John means in verse 27? How is Jesus like a bridegroom and how John is like a friend of the bridegroom (28-30)? What is the status of the one from heaven (31)? Describe the nature of and response to Jesus' testimony (32-34). What has the Father given to Jesus (35)? How is the destiny of a believer different from that of a non-believer (36)?
2. Read verse 30. How do you live out this command? Ask the Lord to reveal and bring repentance of any sins that detract from Jesus' elevated status. Which attributes of Jesus do you find most enchanting? Why? What have these qualities taught you about the Father? Consider a loved one who rejects Jesus and ask God to grant you favor in revealing His truth to the person.

**Day Five: Colossians 1:15-20**

1. Who is the Son (15)? What was created in Him and for Him (16)? How else does creation relate to Jesus (17)? What is Christ's status in the church (18)? Who is He among the dead (18)? What do you think that means? What purpose does this achieve (18)? What pleased God (19)? How does God reconcile all things to Himself (20)?
2. What does this passage reveal to your heart about Jesus' love and purpose in your life? How can you internalize this revelation to a greater degree so as to be more in sync with God's will for your life? Which parts of your life have yet to be reconciled to God by "making peace through His blood"? Surrender them to God, one at a time, asking Him to bless you with complete and lasting reconciliation with Him.
